## **2016 HURON COUNTY LAW ENFORCEMENT TORCH RUN**

**(HURON COUNTY, ON)** - One week from today marks an annual event in Huron County that Special Olympians and Huron County Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) officers look forward to every year. Huron OPP officers and Special Olympians from all over Huron County will run, walk, stroll together on Tuesday, June 14<sup>th</sup>, 2016 in an effort to promote awareness and raise funds for Special Olympics Ontario.

The Ontario Law Enforcement Torch run is a community- based, province-wide event that sees the “Flame of Hope” carried across Ontario by members of law enforcement agencies throughout the province. Since the first Law Enforcement Torch Run that was first established in Canada in 1987, over \$26 million dollars has been raised in the Province of Ontario.

The Huron County Torch Run is scheduled to start at 9:00 a.m. at the Wingham OPP Detachment located on Bristol Terrace. The run will go through Wingham ending at the south end mall. Participants will then be transported to Blyth, Clinton and Goderich where they will complete a run/walk/stroll in each of those communities. After completing the final leg in Goderich participants and supporters will take part in a celebration BBQ. The barbecue is scheduled to take place at 1:00 p.m. located at McGee Motors on Suncoast Drive East in Goderich.

## **TRAFFIC COMPLAINT RESULTS IN OVER 80 CHARGE**

**(SOUTH HURON, ON)** – A 59-year-old from South Huron has been charged with Drive Motor Vehicle – Over 80 Milligrams following a traffic stop that took place this weekend. On June 11<sup>th</sup> at approximately 7:00 p.m. Huron County Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) received notification that a Ford pickup truck was travelling eastbound on Mount Carmel Road in an erratic manner.

Officers began patrolling for the pickup truck and within a few minutes an officer located the pickup truck on McTaggart Line near Huron Street. Upon speaking with the male driver, officers noted he had been drinking alcohol. A roadside screening test was conducted and the driver registered a Fail. He was placed under arrest for Drive Motor Vehicle with Over 80 Milligrams of Alcohol. A search of the vehicle was also completed and officers located an open bottle of liquor inside the vehicle.

The driver was subsequently transported to the Exeter OPP Detachment for breath tests where he provided two samples of his breath to the qualified Intoxilizer Technician; both of his samples registered over the legal limit.

As a result, 59-year-old Paul LOVIE from South Huron has been charged with Drive Motor Vehicle – Over 80 Milligrams of Alcohol and Drive Motor Vehicle with Open Container of Liquor. He has been released from custody with a court appearance scheduled for the Ontario Court of Justice – Goderich on August 8, 2016. He also received an automatic 90 day driver's licence suspension.

### **CANADA REVENUE AGENCY SCAM**

**(HURON COUNTY, ON)** – Since early this year, the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) has been regularly warning the public with regards to the various scams that seem to be reoccurring throughout the province on a daily basis. With the date for filing income tax returns behind us, and some Ontarians having recently received a tax return, one scam in particular that is continuing to catch many off-guard is the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) Scam.

In the CRA scam, criminals will attempt to extort money from their victims by telephone, mail, text message or email, after they have received a fraudulent communication that claims to be from the Canada Revenue Agency requesting personal information such as a social insurance number, credit card number, bank account number, or passport number.

Fraudsters impersonate the real CRA and are either [phishing](#) for your identification or asking that outstanding taxes be paid by a money service business or by pre-paid debit/credit cards. They may insist that the receiver of the call provide personal information so that they can receive a refund or a benefit payment. Cases of fraudulent communication could also involve threatening or coercive language to scare individuals into paying fictitious debt to the CRA. Other communications urge taxpayers to visit a fake CRA website where the taxpayer is then asked to verify their identity by entering personal information. These are scams and taxpayers should never respond to these fraudulent communications nor click on any of the links provided. Calls such as these are even being received on personal and work related telecommunications devices.

Here are some warning signs:

- **Urgency**- The scammer always makes the request sound very urgent, which may cause the victim to not verify the story.
- **Fear**- The scammer plays on the victim's emotions by generating a sense of fear.
- **Request for Money Transfer**- Money is usually requested to be sent by a money transfer company such as Money Gram, Western Union or even through your own financial institution.

To avoid becoming a victim, police advise you to first check with another family member or trusted friend to verify the information **BEFORE** sending money or providing credit card information by phone or e-mail.

If you or someone you know suspect they've been a victim of the Emergency Scam or someone posing as a Canada Revenue Agency official, hang up and contact your local police service. ### **MULTIPLE DEATHS FAR MORE PREVALENT IN TRANSPORT TRUCK-RELATED COLLISIONS, SAYS OPP**

*OPP to Partner with MTO for Operation Corridor on June 16, 2016*

**(HURON COUNTY, ON)** – The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) has responded to more than **27,000** collisions involving large transport trucks over the past five years. For this reason, on June 16, 2016, the OPP is teaming up with the Ministry of Transportation (MTO) for Operation Corridor, a 24-hour enforcement and education initiative aimed at encouraging all commercial vehicle drivers to help keep Ontario roads safe.

Among the truck-related collisions on OPP-patrolled roads between 2011 and 2015, **260** of them resulted in at least one fatality. Tragically, many of the crashes involved multiple fatalities with a total of **321** people having lost their lives.

Of the victims, **281** of them were drivers and passengers in other vehicles involved in the crashes. The other **40** victims were drivers of the transport trucks. Whether these collisions were the result of unsafe driving on the part of the truck drivers or the drivers of other vehicles, the most compelling fact remains that on average, over the five-year period, for every transport truck driver that died in these collisions, there were seven other lives lost.

This latest data reinforces the need for commercial truck drivers to make road safety their number one priority. The statistics also serve as a reminder to other motorists to share the road safely with these large vehicles.

While most of these truck-related incidents were the result of a collision, every year the OPP investigates road incidents involving tires or other equipment dislodging from transport trucks and flying into the path of other vehicles. In many of these instances, the driver and/or other car occupants are seriously injured or killed.

“Every life we lose on our roads is tragic and, sadly, the highest price we pay for crashes on OPP-patrolled roads is in the loss of human life. As our latest data tells us, crashes involving commercial motor vehicles usually result in a higher number of multiple fatalities when compared to collisions involving regular-sized vehicles. Although our officers see many safe drivers on our roads every day, those who are not need to know just how devastating and costly it can be when they fail to make safe driving decisions or do not undertake proper maintenance and truck inspections.” - OPP Deputy Commissioner Brad Blair, Provincial Commander of Traffic Safety and Operational Support.

During the campaign, Huron County OPP officers and their MTO road safety partners will be ensuring that commercial truck drivers are driving safely and that their trucks are being properly inspected and maintained.

### **MULTIPLE DEATHS FAR MORE PREVALENT IN TRANSPORT TRUCK-RELATED COLLISIONS, SAYS OPP**

#### *Transport Truck Driver Receives 3-Day Suspension*

**(HURON COUNTY, ON)** – Operation Corridor, a one-day enforcement and education initiative aimed at all commercial vehicle drivers to help keep Ontario roads safe was a considered a success for Huron County Ontario Provincial Police (OPP). Five large commercial motor vehicles were subjected a thorough safety check. A full mechanical inspection on each vehicle and attached trailer was conducted. The OPP trained Commercial Motor Vehicle Inspector also checked for completed and up-to-date documentation of log books, pre-trip permits, licences and insurance certificates.

All of the vehicles checked out in terms of safety. However, during an inspection in Wingham, the officer noted the transport truck driver had been drinking alcohol. A roadside screening test was completed and the driver registered a Warn Range suspension. As a result, a 51-year-old male from Chesley was served with a 3-day driver's licence suspension.

#### **FEMALE ATTACKED ON TRAIL – MALE ARRESTED**

**(SOUTH HURON, ON)** – Last night a sexual assault took place on a public trail that lies between MacNaughton Park in Exeter and the Morrison Dam Conservation Area on Morrison Line.

At around 6:30 p.m. an adult female had been out using the MacNaughton-Morrison Trail when she was attacked by a stranger from behind and sexually assaulted. The



attacker fled the scene on a bicycle heading into Exeter. A short while later, Huron County Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) located and arrested a male suspect.

The investigation continues however at this time 19-year-old, Mitchell WEBSTER from Exeter is facing two charges of Failing to Comply with Conditions of a Probation Order. The accused has since been released from custody. He has a court date scheduled for July 4, 2016 at the Ontario Court of Justice - Goderich.

**FEMALE ATTACKED ON TRAIL – MALE ARRESTED**  
*Accused Facing Additional Charges*

**(SOUTH HURON, ON)** – A local man is now in police custody on sexual assault and robbery charges following an attack that took place on a public trail that lies between MacNaughton Park in Exeter and the Morrison Dam Conservation Area on Morrison Line.

On June 18, 2016 at around 6:30 p.m. an adult female had been out using the MacNaughton-Morrison Trail when she was attacked from behind by a stranger and sexually assaulted.

Investigators have now laid the following additional charges against Mitchell WEBSTER, 19 years of age from Exeter:

- Sexual Assault
- Robbery
- Fail to Comply with Probation Order (Two counts)

He is currently in police custody with a court appearance scheduled for June 24, 2016 at the Ontario Court of Justice – Goderich.

## **IMPAIRED & OVER 80 CHARGES LAID**

**(SOUTH HURON, ON)** – A 54-year-old from South Huron will have to attend court later this summer to face Impaired Driving charges following a traffic stop that took place on June 18, 2016. At 12:13 p.m. Huron County Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) officers were dispatched to patrol for a possible impaired driver that was last seen leaving a gas bar located on Main Street North in Exeter.

Approximately 10 minutes later a Huron OPP officer was able to locate the suspect vehicle travelling southbound on Ausable Line near Huron Street West. A traffic stop was initiated and the driver of the GMC van was spoken to about his driving. Upon speaking with the male driver the investigating officer noted the male had been drinking alcohol and he was displaying several signs that his ability to drive was impaired by alcohol.

The driver was placed under arrest for Impaired Driving and was transported to the Exeter OPP Detachment for breath tests. He subsequently provided two samples of his breath to a qualified Intoxilizer Technician and both samples registered over the legal limit.

As a result, 54-year-old Douglas MARSHALL from South Huron been charged with Impaired Driving and Drive Motor Vehicle – Over 80 Milligrams of Alcohol. He has since been released from custody with a court appearance scheduled for the Ontario Court of Justice – Goderich on August 8, 2016. He also received an automatic 90 day driver's licence suspension and his vehicle was impounded for seven days.

## **SEATBELT VIOLATION LEADS TO OVER 80 CHARGE**

**(SOUTH HURON, ON)** – A driver that failed to buckle up is facing much more than a seatbelt ticket following a traffic stop that took place last Friday. At approximately 8:15 p.m. on June 24, 2016 a Huron County Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) officer noticed a Honda Civic travelling northbound on Bluewater Highway near Dashwood Road. The driver of the Civic failed to have his seatbelt on so the officer initiated a traffic stop.

While speaking with the male driver the officer detected the odour of alcohol coming from the driver's. A roadside screening test was performed which resulted in the driver registering a fail. He was placed under arrest for Driving a Motor Vehicle With Over 80 Milligrams of Alcohol and was transported to the Exeter OPP Detachment for breath tests. He subsequently provided two samples of his breath to a qualified Intoxilizer Technician and both of his samples registered over the legal limit.

As a result, 48-year-old Barrie JACKSON from Parkhill has been charged with Drive Motor Vehicle – Over 80 Milligrams of Alcohol & Fail to Properly Wear Seatbelt. He was later released from custody with a court appearance scheduled for August 8, 2016 at the Ontario Court of Justice – Goderich. He also received an automatic 90-day driver's licence suspension and his vehicle has been impounded for seven days.

## **A SAFETY REMINDER FROM THE HURON OPP MARINE UNIT**

### *Paddle Boarder Receives \$240 Ticket*

**(HURON COUNTY, ON)** – As we enter the busy summer boating season the Huron County Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) Marine Unit would like to provide residents and visitors to our area with two vital safety tips to follow while out enjoying on our local waterways.

The goal this year and every year for the Huron OPP Marine Unit is a safe boating season free from fatalities. Unfortunately, every year throughout our Province too many individuals die on the water from not following two basic safety tenets. Always wear a lifejacket / PFD and Don't cruise with booze.

The statistics show the majority of victims who die in fatal boating incidents are not wearing a personal floatation device (PFD) or a lifejacket. In 2015, the OPP investigated 16 fatal boating incidents in which 18 people died. Falling overboard, capsized or swamped vessels, speed and alcohol and failure to wear a lifejacket or PFD were all contributing factors in the fatalities. Sadly, the trend continues in 2016.

Under the Small Vessel Regulations of the Canada Shipping Act boaters are required to carry a minimum of one lifejacket or PFD for each person on board. Huron OPP would like to point out that this law applies to operators of pleasure craft that is owned, rented or borrowed. This law applies to conventional vessels such as power boats, sail boats and personal watercraft (PWC) and to other vessels such as stand up paddleboards (SUP), water cycles, kayaks, canoes, sailboards and kiteboards.

Last weekend, a paddle boarder was stopped on Lake Huron near Bayfield and the paddle boarder received a **\$240** ticket for failing to wear a lifejacket / PFD on his paddleboard. The paddle boarder was surprised to learn that he needed to wear a life jacket / PFD and was even more surprised about the cost of the ticket.

Transport Canada, classifies Stand Up Paddleboards as human powered vessels when they are being used for navigation. When undertaking a trip or circuit such as a group crossing or solo outing, this is considered navigation. As human powered vessels, Stand Up Paddleboards are subject to all carriage requirements, including lifejackets. There must be one Canadian approved lifejacket or personal floatation device available on board and available for immediate use.

Huron OPP would also like to dispel any notion that fatal boating incidents on OPP-patrolled waterways usually involve motorized vessels.

*“A significant number of the boating deaths we investigate every year involve canoes and kayaks. Because the victims were not wearing a lifejacket, the majority of them died either because they could not swim, the water was too cold or they were impaired by alcohol or drugs. I cannot stress enough how significantly a properly worn lifejacket*

*improves your chance of survival when you are in any type of boat and suddenly find yourself in the water,” - OPP Deputy Commissioner Brad Blair, Commander of Traffic Safety and Operational Support.*

Unfortunately some people feel safe just having lifejackets and PFDs on board. What they fail to recognize is that many dangerous boating incidents happen very quickly and there's no time to grab your PFD. By the time you realize you need it, more often than not, it's too late. Other people don't wear them because they think PFDs and lifejackets are uncomfortable and will take away from their boating enjoyment. The reality is that PFDs and lifejackets have come a long way and are designed with comfort in mind. Always wear your lifejacket!

Staying safe on the water also means never mixing alcohol and boating. Mixing alcohol and boating is far more dangerous than you may think. Under normal conditions sun, wind, and the motion of the boat can dull your senses. Adding alcohol to this mix makes things worse, slowing your hand-eye coordination and clouding your judgement. Always remember, “Don't Cruise with booze!” Drinking and driving, whether on land or on the water is against the law and the consequences can last a lifetime. Keep in mind these laws apply to anyone who is caught drinking and operating motorized and non-motorized vessels, including power boats, canoes, kayaks, personal watercraft, paddleboards, sailboats, dinghies and other inflatable boats and rafts.

If you suspect that a person is operating any type of boat while impaired, please call 9-1-1 and report them, in doing so, you could be saving lives.

Huron County OPP is counting on everyone being on board with making it a safe boating season. Stay safe and smooth sailing.

## **EIGHT ROAD DEATHS, TWO MULTIPLE FATALITY COLLISIONS OVER WEEKEND HAVE OPP APPEALING TO DRIVERS**

*No Room for Poor Driving Behaviour on Busy Roads Over Long Weekend*

**(HURON COUNTY, ON)** – In the wake of a tragic weekend that saw eight people die in four separate collisions on Ontario Provincial Police (OPP)-patrolled roads, the OPP is appealing to drivers who plan on heading out this coming long weekend to avoid all forms of risk that could contribute to further loss of life on Ontario roads.

Two of the weekend incidents involved multiple fatalities, with one of the collisions claiming four lives and another that resulted in the death of a motorcyclist and his passenger. The deaths bring the number of persons killed on OPP-patrolled roads so far this year to **128** (as of June 26, 2016).

With the Canada Day Long Weekend starting tomorrow, this recent rash of fatal crashes are important reminders of the significant toll poor driving behaviour takes on road users.

Over the long weekend (July 1-3, 2016) speeding and all other forms of aggressive driving will be some of the behaviours OPP officers will have a watchful eye on, as highways and roads see some of the busiest traffic volumes of the year.

Last year (2015), officers laid more than **250,000** speeding charges on OPP-patrolled roads and an additional **4,000** charges for racing, one of the most dangerous behaviours which involves driving more than 50 kilometres per hour over the posted speed limit (Highway Traffic Act, Section 172).

“Whether you are speeding, tail-gating, weaving in and out of traffic or accelerating when approaching a yellow traffic light, aggressive driving is a deliberate behaviour that costs people their lives every year. Ontario roads will be very busy this weekend and we are counting on all motorists to drive defensively and avoid all manners of risk so that all road users can travel safely.”
